

The More the Merrier

After several years of rabbit rescue, I've had lots of young rabbits come into foster care, but I've had little to no experience with newborn and baby rabbits. For that reason, I was nervous when I was asked to take in a pregnant rabbit. Even with my lack of experience, being with me was better than the alternatives, since she was in desperate need of a foster home.

The arrangements had been made and I was to pick her up two days before Christmas. I can only imagine how scared and nervous she must have felt being transported several times and being ready to give birth. With that in mind and the fact that it was two days before Christmas, I decided to name her Merry.

By the time I arrived to take Merry to her new foster home,





she had given birth. We weren't sure how many babies she had and we didn't want to add to her stress with all she had been through until absolutely necessary.

I transferred her and the mound of hay and fur into a smaller cage that would fit in my car. After checking the remaining hay to make sure no little one was overlooked, Merry and her unknown number of babies were on their way to their new foster home.

Knowing I would be picking her up, I already had the pen ready so she wouldn't have to wait to get settled in her new digs. I then needed to transfer the babies into what is known as a nesting box. A nesting

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box keeps the mother from accidentally trampling any of the delicate newborns. I wanted to get them out of the damp, bloody straw and into a warm dry environment. I put a towel in the bottom of the wooden box, then opened up some sterile cotton balls to mix with as much of Merry's fur from the original nest as possible.

It was now time to transfer them into the nesting box. I put on some sterile surgical gloves then gave Merry lots of pets so I would have her scent on the gloves. I started to move some

Are Your Rabbits Flood Ready?

In light of all the flooding in recent months, we really need to be sure we have plans for our rabbits. Are your rabbits kept in a basement? Do you live near a lake, pond, stream or overflow ditch? Are the sewers in your town old and in need of replacement? Is there a possibility of your house flooding?

We have plans in case of fire, but do we have plans in case of flooding? It's important to have a plan in case your rabbit needs to have long-term temporary housing. Can you move your rabbit to another part of your house? Do you have friends or family who could house your rabbit until your house is cleaned and livable? Do you have an extra set of litter boxes, exercise pens or other housing, food bowls and water dishes in case your rabbit's things are under water? Does your rabbit have some way of getting off the floor and onto higher ground if it does start flooding and you aren't home? If you have multiple rabbits, do you have enough pet carriers for all your rabbits at one time? All very important questions that need to be answered well before a flood occurs.

If you live in a flood-prone area, you may want to consider these things. Have a set of everything your rabbit will need to live in a part of the house that won't flood. Talk to friends or family members about housing your rabbit if a flood occurs and you need to get your rabbit elsewhere quickly. Have your bunny's food and hay in containers that won't fill with water or keep them high enough off the floor so that they won't get wet. Make sure your rabbits have some way of getting up off the floor so they can be on dry, higher ground. Check that you have enough pet carriers to put all your rabbits in and move them all at the same time.

With the extreme weather we seem to be having now, it is essential that your rabbits are just as ready as you are.

of the fur and straw expecting to find two to four baby bunnies. I couldn't believe my eyes; there they were, several tiny little kits. I was amazed. As I started moving them into the box, I continued to count. One, two, three.... TEN BABIES.

Still amazed at the fact that Merry had ten babies, I placed the nesting box in the pen. She went over to the box and checked it out by pushing her nose through the cotton balls and fur. She must have been pleased, because she then went over to the timothy hay and started nibbling.

Over the next couple of days I left them alone as much as possible. Every day I would take the box out, put on the Merry-scented surgical gloves and check on the babies to make sure they were doing well. I had been warned by several people to be prepared that they all may not make it. With that in mind, I would hesitantly go and check on them, afraid of what I might find; I was always relieved to see that they were all doing well.

Merry seemed like a sweet rabbit from the beginning. After the first couple of days of leaving them alone (except to check on the babies and give Merry fresh food and water),



I started to let Merry out of the pen for some exercise. She really did seem to be grateful to me for taking her in and giving her and her babies a safe haven. She immediately came to me for pets and even liked it when I picked her up. I would hold her like a baby, give her kisses on her head and tell her what a good mommy she was.

I've heard from several people not to worry if I didn't see Merry nursing because it's not common for a rabbit to nurse in front of people. I didn't worry, since I continued to see the babies grow. I was still leaving them alone except when I cleaned out the nesting box and checked on them. I really felt that Merry trusted me, because she stayed calm and requested affection while I carried out our routine.

I had been taking pictures on a regular basis while taking care of my new house guests. I went down for our daily business with camera in hand. As I opened up the pen, Merry came over to me for pets then looked at me and proceeded to the nesting box. I cannot tell you how honored I was for her to show such trust by jumping in the nesting box and nursing her babies. I was so glad I had the camera because it was like she was giving me permission to photograph this private event. I'm still amazed and honored to this day that she allowed me to witness and photograph her maternal duties.

Every day the babies got bigger. They looked like small puppies with long ears. One by one, they began to open their eyes and their ears started popping up. By now Merry had no problem with me handling the babies and moving them around. I so enjoyed giving them gentle little pets.

Eventually they started moving around more. Like a rogue piece of popcorn flying out of the popcorn popper, they started jumping out of the nesting box. I went to the store and got a high top cat litter box. Merry had no problem getting in and out of the box and the babies didn't have enough spring in their step yet to get out of the new box. By the time they would be able to get out of this box, they would be big enough that their chances for injury would



lessen along with my concerns.

Before long they were in and out of the new box and running all around the pen. I was a little concerned with how much work it would be to clean up after ten baby rabbits. Once again, I was amazed and my concern laid to rest. The babies were going into Merry's litter box and using it. I couldn't believe it.

Since the babies were now running around the pen, they would come up to the fresh spring mix I put out for Merry. I thought that it was a good time for them to start exploring the rabbit room and it would be nice to let Merry eat in peace, so I took them all out and let them run the room. Merry, once again, seemed grateful and enjoyed eating without having ten little ones all over the place. What I really loved was how Merry would come to the edge of the pen when she was finished to let me know that she was ready to have her offspring return to their room.

Everyday I would let the babies out while Merry had some alone time. I really enjoyed sitting on the floor with the babies and letting them hop all over me and play with each other. Eventually, when Merry had finished eating, I would get her out and all of us would enjoy each other's company. One day when I returned them to the pen, I noticed some of the babies going over to the spring mix and eating it. I wasn't sure when they should start eating solid foods, so I just let them take the lead and soon they were all eating alfalfa hay and spring mix. concerned about keeping the girls and boys together. I had checked and thought that there were seven females and three males, but I didn't trust myself and decided it would be best to take them to the vet to be sexed. Merry was no longer nursing and I had decided that after the males and females were sexed, they needed to go into separate pens even though the idea made me sad. At the vet's I found out that I did have seven females and three males.

All that was left to do now was to wait for them to be old enough to be spayed and neutered. The boys could be neutered as soon as they dropped (which was about 3 ½ months), but the girls had to wait until six months. The vet said that they like to make sure everything is developed so they don't miss removing anything during the surgery.

After all the spays and neuters, the babies were ready for adoption. They were all named, had their pictures taken and copy was written. Now I wait for each one to find his or her own permanent home.

There are so many rabbits out there in need of good homes that limiting the number of rabbit births would be the responsible thing for society to do and I hope that our policy of spaying and neutering has helped reduce the number of homeless rabbits. With that in mind, I still enjoyed the experience of watching the ten adorable rabbits grow. I love each one and hope they all get the good caring homes they deserve.





Many of you have been following the sad situation in Lorain County, where over 100 rabbits were living in deplorable conditions in a single home. Now, two years later, and after much work by our volunteers and generous donations from our members, we're pleased to report that all but 12 of the rabbits are either in foster care with the Buckeye HRS or at the Cleveland Animal Protection League. The APL has taken in about 30 of these rabbits and has done an excellent job caring for them and putting them up for adoption.

The remaining 12 are being cared for by the family, who is having a difficult time parting with their "favorites". We will continue to work with

the mother and children to convince them that these bunnies will be much better off in an adoptive home, where they can receive the care and attention they deserve.

Six years ago I brought home a rescued bundle of white fur with the most beautiful blue eyes. Since she was as pretty as a flower, I named her Lily. Lily became the companion to Sweetpea, my little boy rabbit. It was love at first sight. She was loving,

Although she wasn't as affectionate with me, she still let me know that she loved me in her own way. I'm grateful for the fact that Sweetpea and I were there with her during her passing and I know that she was too. She was an important part of our family and we all miss her greatly.

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Saturday, September 1st I lost the sweetest little bunny boy in the whole world, my Sweetpea. He was approximately ten years old and in good health. Although I showered him with as much affection as I could since Lily's passing July 29th, I think he just missed her so much and was ready to move on.

He is the reason that I started rescuing rabbits. Because of him, dozens of rabbits have found loving homes. The affection and joy that he brought into my life inspired me to spread the word and be an active part of educating and fostering so I could teach others the love and happiness that rabbits can give to humans.

Friday night I picked him up and placed him on my chest for our daily snuggle time. With his tiny tongue he licked my face, chin and cheek. This wasn't an unusual thing for him to do periodically during snuggle time, but this night he did it the entire time I held him. Saturday morning after he had peacefully passed away, I realized that the kisses were his way of saying goodbye. I regretted not being with him as I was with Lily. A friend of mine shared the fact that he had to leave me this way or I wouldn't have let him go. He was right.

It's amazing the amount of love that this tiny rabbit that weighed less than 2 lbs. was able to give and inspire. I promised him when I made him part of my family that he had found a permanent home until the day he no longer needed one on this earth. I kept my promise.
